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# To everyone suffering from hay fever! Treat and prevent it early on!

In spring, many people are troubled by "cedar and cypress pollen allergies." During the pollen season, information about pollen dispersion is often provided in weather forecasts, so be sure to check the news and take early preventive measures.

- ♦ When going out
- ① Wear a mask
  A disposable mask that fits your face and allows for easy breathing is recommended.
- ② Wear glasses

  There are special glasses for hay fever, but even just using regular glasses will reduce the amount of pollen that gets into your eyes.
- ③ Wear clothes that do not attract pollen easily Avoid wearing clothing that attracts pollen, such as wool, and choose clothes such as cotton or polyester. By wearing a hat, you can reduce the amount of pollen on your head.
- ♦ When you return from going out
- ① Do not let pollen enter your home.

  Before entering your home, remove pollen from your clothes.
- ② Gargling and washing your faceWhen you get home, be sure to gargle and wash your face to remove pollen from your face.
- ♦ When you are at home
- ① When ventilating your home, open windows only a little for a short time.
- 2 Clean your house to reduce pollen indoors.

# Please do not throw away household garbage on roads, mountains, rivers, etc.

Please do not dispose of items such as televisions and futons on roadsides, in mountains, forests, rivers, or fields. Also, refrain from burning household waste.

## **Procedure for Light Motor Vehicle Tax**

If you own a light car or motorcycle, please be sure to make a declaration (do the procedures) for cases ① to ⑤ below.

- ① When moving outside the city or abroad
- When scrapping (throwing away) a light car or motorcycle
- When giving a light car or motorcycle to someone
- When selling a light car or motorcycle
- (5) When a light car or motorcycle has been stolen

Until you complete the procedures, you must continue paying the light motor vehicle tax. Failure to pay taxes may lead to complications during residency qualification procedures. For information on the procedure for light motor vehicle tax, please refer to the Utsunomiya City website.

### Janet from the USA

We asked Janet about her hometown of Oregon, her confusion in Japan, what she likes about Utsunomiya, her activities at UCIA, and what she values most.

Janet: Through UCIA activities, I am not only grateful for the opportunity to support foreigners living in the city and strengthen the bonds with our sister cities, but also to deepen my understanding of Utsunomiya City and engage in things that I wouldn't have the opportunity to do.

**UCIA: Thank you, Janet!** 


